Dear Dog Lady,
I fear my dog Olivia, a small ter-

rier mix, might be on the spectrum. I've always thought she exhibited autistic tendencies. For example, she gets easily fixated on things and when she's with other dogs, she tends to ignore them. She sits and stares at her treats before she eats them, which seems the oddest tendency of all.

I read recently that a British morning TV show sent out a tweet seeking people who believe the distemper and parvo vaccinations caused autism in their dogs. Olivia has gotten all her shots but I wonder if I've gone too far. Have you heard of autism in dogs? And what are

the signs?

—Cristeta

Dear Cristeta,

Yes, Olivia is autistic because ALL dogs are autistic. The species, in general, displays many signs of being on the spectrum—the fixations, the compulsions, the repetitive movements, the social indifference around the dogs they like, the fierce revulsion toward the dogs they don't. You're worried about this? Of all canine conundrums, there's so much else with which to be concerned —parvo

rake, sweep, pick up and beautify the twin Victorian squares. The Boston Parks and Recreation Department, represented by Rick Thompson, supplied rakes and bags while the WeLoveU volunteers, clad in bright blue shirts, helped neighbors make the popular parks spic and span.

According to Mark Ott, at large board member of B/FSNA, WeLoveU approached the association to offer the cleanup, and it was greatly appreciated. "It's amazing! We've got about 70 people here, maybe more, working with the Friends of Blackstone and Franklin Squares and cleaning everything. They've cleaned up sticks, they've cleaned up needles, they've cleaned up trash. We've done things that haven't been done in a long time. It's probably one of the best cleanups we've ever had," Ott said. "This is the second or third year. It's going to be an annual thing for us."

Rick Thompson of the Boston Parks and Recreation Department commented, "They turned the park upside down. There's not that much trash here, it's more or less getting the leaves and twigs from the storm last month. Both parks are immaculately clean. They did an awesome job." Also joining the cleaning crew was Boston Medical Center emergency room physician Jon Santiago, who is on the ballot to challenge incumbent Byron Rush-

ing for the seat of state representative for the Ninth District.

The International WeLoveU Foundation was founded in South Korea in 2001 by Zahng C'il-Jah, with a mission to raise living standards throughout the world through volunteer elbow grease and donating funding and supplies to aid groups and programs in the US and elsewhere.

For example, through its Clean WORLD (Water, Oxygen, Region, Life, and Descendants) Movement, WeLoveU donated 3,000 solar powered lanterns to the Bright Haiti initiative to aid vocational students in Haiti, where 75 percent of the population has no electricity and access is inconsistent even for those who do have power. The Clean WORLD Movement is ongoing," spokesperson Rebecca Ebhardt said. "We are always reaching out to communities to see where we can help out, and spread awareness to members of the community that this is our place to live and we have to take good care of it." Some of the WeLoveU volunteers, including Nelson Delgado of Portland, Maine; Lucas Rivero of Leominster and Sonny Ketnouvong of Fitchburg drove a distance to participate in the cleanup. Volunteer Giselle Diaz of Westborough staffed the information tent in Blackstone Square and informed visitors about WeLoveU's work.

"I was looking for a volunteer opportunity and I like their message. It's like spreading a mother's love, and we can all relate to that," Diaz said.

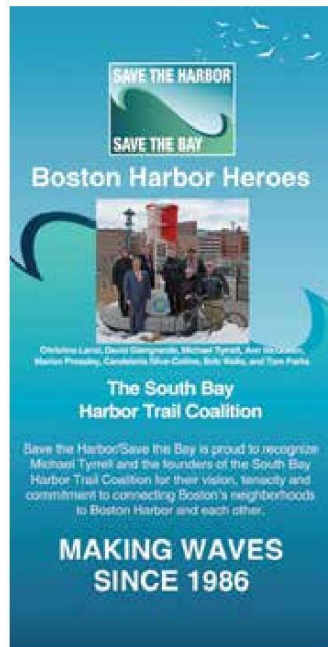

and distemper, for example. These diseases kill dogs. If our pets are not immunized, parvo is very easy for them to pick up on dirty city streets and dog parks.

In Britain, after that "Fox and Friends"ish morning show sent out the loopy tweet, the British Veterinary Association — a powerful group in a canine-crazy country—issued an advisory stating unequivocally dogs cannot develop autism. (No, they're born with it—and happier for it.)

Human anti-vaxxers — such as talk show host and Wahlberg-by-marriage Jenny McCarthy whose son has autism she claims — were initially given platforms to spout their theories about the dangers of childhood immunizations. Thankfully, in recent years, their voices have been stilled by medical good sense.

Dear Dog Lady,

I have a fantastic rescue dog, Haley, who lives with me and my family. I speak only Chinese to my parents and aunt in my household. Haley must know Chinese too.

When she meets dogs at the dog park or the street she can become scared or aggressive. I have to stay right with her and try to keep her under control because she barks, growls or wants to hide behind me. But if the dogs are also from Chinese-speaking homes (and I ask), my dog is relaxed. She plays, sniffs freely, and runs around. Does this make sense?

Dear Wen,

Makes good sense. Haley detects a cultural kinship with other dogs accustomed to life in Chinese-speaking homes and your dog picks up the vibes from her four-legged kin. The only explanation is animal instinct, which is really themagic (Chinese: "moshu") of dogs. They are incredibly sentient creatures with Buddha-like reserves of wisdom, knowledge and mystery.

When Haley is comfortable with another dog and the owner tells you Chinese plays no part in the household, you have an opportunity for a teachable moment. Reward Haley for being calm with another dog with no Asian inclination.

Imagine Boston, Imagine South End

Every spring, the City of Boston releases our Imagine Boston Capital Plan for the next five years. It outlines where our city's budget will be focused, our longer-term plans, and our priorities. Essentially, the capital plan details what initiatives and projects in your neighborhood and across the City that we'll be investing in to make Boston's future brighter.

From South End, to Mattapan, to Allston-Brighton, to Back Bay, it's my priority to create growth and opportunity for every Bostonian in every neighborhood. Boston will be at its best when all its residents have the support

and opportunity they need to thrive. Investing in initiatives and projects that bring shared growth, success, and greater equity is critical for our city to reach its full potential. Our Capital Plan invests in Boston's strongest asset: our people. Boston is a city that's world class because it works for the middle class, and our budget's priority is to keep supporting the working families that make Boston great.

Here in the South End, we're investing in some exciting initiatives and projects that we hope you and your neighbors will enjoy for many years to come.

We are investing in shared community spaces around the neighborhood starting with a \$4.2 million investment in the South Bay

Harbor Trail, which will serve as an important link in the City's Greenway, connecting trails from the Fenway, the Southwest Corridor, Charles River Park, Broadway Bridge, and the Central Artery parks.

We are also investing \$2.4 million for renovating Ramsay Park including a new play lot, basketball courts, tennis courts, plazas, passive areas, and lighting. Residents will once again be enjoying these park spaces in a matter of months.

A \$132,000 investment will be put towards completing improvements to the South End Branch Library, including an

Hurley School's Bodega de Arte, a bilingual, arts-based after-school program. Among the guests were State House

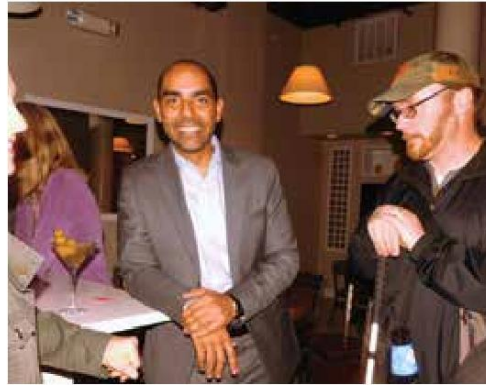

interior reconfiguration project and major electrical, telecommunications, paint, and carpet upgrades.

\$1.39 million will be set aside to complete renovations of the South End Fitness Center pool, which will include the installation of a rain screen wall, new ventilation, pool repairs, and door and window replacements.

The City is repairing our roadways starting with a \$1.75 million investment to conduct roadway improvements including resurfacing, pavement markings, and new traffic signals to Washington Street from East Berkeley to Herald Street and Traveler Street. There will also be a \$100,000 investment for road reconstruction improvements to Harrison Avenue between East Berkeley Street

and Herald Street as part of a \$2.2 million multi-year project.

Our longer-term investments are intended to lift up our neighborhoods in ways that take into account the needs and wants of the community. With this Capital Plan, we're preparing our city for the next year, and the years forward.

What's the next step for the Capital Plan? I have submitted the City of Boston's budget to the Boston City Council, where your City Councilor will review the proposed budget. Once the budget is approved, it will go into effect. This is the budget for fiscal year 2019, meaning the budget will take effect in July 2018, and run throughout the next 12 months.

I hope you'll take a few minutes to look through the budget proposal, online at budget.boston.gov. Together, I look forward to investing in our neighborhoods, and our people.

Sondheim musical "Merrily We Roll Along" was the most honored production with seven nods: costumes—Soutra Gilmour, ensemble, music director—Matthew Stern, supporting actress—Aimee Doherty, actress—Eden Espinosa, director—Maria Friedman and musical. The company's other three prizes included two for "A Guide for the Homesick"—new play to dramatist Ken Urban for "a Guide for the Homesick"—and actor to Malcolm Beecher III—and projection design to Lucy McKinnon for "Ripcord." Huntington managing director Michael Maso, accepting for Urban, read his announcement about rehearsing a new play in Washington D.C. set in the South End "so that I am there in spirit."

SpeakEasy's biggest winner—the area premiere of the Tony Award play "The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time"—took five IRNE's: set design—Christopher and Justin Swader, lighting design—Jeff Adelberg, sound design—David Remedios, director—Paul Daigneault and play. Actor nominee Eliot Purcell paid tribute to the late great actors Thomas Derrah and Larry Coen as mentors in accepting the play prize. In addition to Derrah and Coen, this year's awards were dedicated in memoriam to former IRNE member and Bay Windows editor Rudy Kikel, tech veteran Ben Williams, American Repertory Theatre longtime force Jan Ceidt and Stage Source mover and regular IRNE award presenter Jack Welch. The company's other four honors went to SpeakEasy's area premiere of "The Bridges of Madison County": supporting actress—Kerry Dowling, actress—Jennifer Ellis, actor—Christiaan Smith and music director—Matthew Stern.

BCA wins also included seven fringe prizes—three to Moonbox Productions, two to Zeitgeist Stage Company and two to Flat Earth Theatre. Moonbox received two for its revival of the Broadway hit play "The 39 Steps"—supporting actor to Matthew Zahnzinger and Bob Mussett (who played a slew of roles) and ensemble—and one for the musical "Barnum"—costume design—Marian Bertone. Zeitgeist artistic director David Miller won two prizes for the area premiere of the play "Faceless"—director and production. Miller, alluding to Trump's Muslim travel ban and

noting small audiences for this timely play dealing with divisive perceptions of Muslims and Islam, warned, "It's a matter of Trump Fatigue."

Flat Earth won two fringe acting awards—supporting actress to Juliet Bowler in "Silent Sky" and actress to Lindsay Eagle in "Fat Pig." Eagle spoke of the need to "raise up those whose stories we never hear." She also declared, "I choose to be revolutionary and I hope the Boston theater community joins me." Even visiting honors went to BCA fare—prizes for visiting production "American Moor" from O.W.I. (Bureau of Theatre) and Phoenix Theatre and for its electrifying solo performer Keith Hamilton Cobb. Just announced is Cobb's return engagement in April, 2019—this time with Arts Emerson—as the play's African-American actor dealing with both the challenges of the theater and the role of Othello. Lyric Stage's sole prize was given to Dan Whelton for supporting actor-midsize stage in the company's revival of "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?"

Boston Children's Theatre is no conventional young company, as demonstrated by its haunting recent production of "The Diary of Anne Frank." Now this singular troupe is powerfully confronting dystopia in "George Orwell's 1984" at the Calderwood Pavilion. Entering audience members will feel as though they have entered Oceania as they sit before Janie E. Howland's chillingly surreal set and confront backdrop telecreens with Big Brother eyes and such Newspeak slogans as "War Is Peace" and "Freedom Is Slavery." Under company artistic director Burgess Clark's taut guidance, IRNE Award-winning Zehava Younger (for her moving portrayal of Anne) has the right creepiness as Big Brother Goldstein, and Brendan Callahan as Winston and Alexandra Upton as Julia capture the inner conflicts and pathos of the focal 'thought criminals.' In an age of fake news, escalating governmental lies and increasing invasions of privacy, BCT's riveting staging is alarmingly resonant.

Leave it to the song and dance-strong show "On Your Feet: The Emilio and Gloria Estefan Broadway Musical" to show the title

Alexander Dinelaris' book may suffer at times from schmaltz and bio-musical business, but Sergio Trujillo's sharp choreography, a high-energy cast and the show's infectious rhythm and goodwill make "On Your Feet" truly happen. Make sure you stay for the rollicking curtain hoofing of the entire cast.

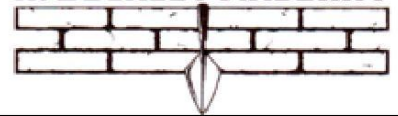
