INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors of Atlanta Pride Committee, Inc.

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Atlanta Pride Committee, Inc. (a nonprofit organization) which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2020, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. December 31, 2020

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Background

Atlanta Pride Committee, Inc. (APC) is a non-profit organization that was organized to promote unity, visibility, and self-esteem among lesbians, gay men, bisexuals, and transgender persons and to promote a positive image in the Atlanta area and throughout the southeastern United States through community activities and services. Also, the organization provides lesbians, gay men, bisexuals, and transgender persons with educational programs and activities which enhance mental and physical health, provide social support, and foster an awareness of the past and present contributions of lesbians, gay men, bisexuals, and transgender persons, through community activities and services, including an annual Pride Event.

Method of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Financial Statement Presentation

Atlanta Pride Committee, Inc. is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets (without donor restrictions and with donor restrictions) based upon the existence or absence of donor - imposed restrictions.

Contributions

Contributions received are recorded as net assets with donor restrictions or net assets without donor restrictions depending on the existence or nature of donor restrictions. During the current year, APC received no contributions with donor-imposed restrictions.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of ninety days or less to be cash equivalents.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Donated Goods, Services and Facilities

Donated in-kind goods, services and facilities are reflected as contributions in the accompanying statements at their estimated values at date of receipt. The agency records the value of donated goods as program expense when there is an objective basis available to determine the fair market value of the goods, services, and facilities. APC receives donated services from a variety of unpaid volunteers who assist the agency in providing program services. No amounts have been reflected in the statement of activity because the criteria for recognition of such volunteer effort have not been satisfied. Nevertheless, a substantial number of volunteers donated a significant amount of their time to the agency.

Property and Equipment and Depreciation

The agency follows the practice of capitalizing all fixed assets with a life of more than one year and a cost greater than \$500. Property and equipment are recorded at cost or fair market value if contributed. Depreciation of property and equipment is provided on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of 5 to 7 years.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable is stated at unpaid balances, less an allowance for doubtful accounts. The Organization provides for losses on accounts receivable using the allowance method. The allowance is based on experience, third-party contracts, and other circumstances, which may affect the ability of contractors to meet their obligations. Receivables are considered impaired if full principal payments are not received in accordance with the contractual terms. It is the Organization's policy to charge off uncollectible accounts receivable when management determines the receivable will not be collected.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The agency has financial instruments, none of which are held for trading purposes, which consists of cash in money market accounts. The carrying amounts reported in the statement financial position approximate fair values.

3. **INCOME TAXES**

Atlanta Pride Committee, Inc. is exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code. It is also exempt from State of Georgia income taxes and, therefore, no provision has been made for federal and/or state income taxes. In addition, Atlanta Pride Committee, Inc. has been determined by the Internal Revenue Service not to be a "private foundation" within the meaning of Section 509(a) of the Code.

Management has considered the tax positions taken in its tax returns and believes that all the positions taken by the Organization in its federal and state exempt organization tax returns are more likely-than-not to be sustained upon examination. The Organization's returns for the years ended December 31, 2019, 2018 and 2017 could be subject to examination by taxing authorities, generally for 3 years after they are filed.

4. VACATION AND SICK LEAVE PAYABLE

Employees earn vacation and sick leave depending on years of service. Accrued vacation is paid upon an employee's termination. Accrued sick leave is not paid upon employee termination. A liability for accumulated leave of \$3,172 is included in the financial statements on December 31, 2020.

5. <u>COMMITMENTS</u>

The agency leases general office space under an operating lease. The space lease began on August 1, 2017 for a lease term of 48 months at a base rental of \$1,730 per month with annual increases. Rent for the year ending December 31, 2020 was \$21,407.

6. <u>DEBT OBLIGATIONS</u>

On April 28, 2020, the agency was granted a loan from PayPal through WebBank in the amount of \$46,142, pursuant to the Paycheck Protection Program (the PPP). PPP was established as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES) provided loans to qualifying businesses for amounts up to 2.5 times the average monthly payroll expenses of the qualifying business. The loan and accrued interest are forgivable after eight weeks if the borrower uses the loan proceeds for eligible purposes, including payroll, benefits, rent and utilities and maintains its payroll levels. The amount of loan forgiveness will be reduced if the borrower terminated employees or reduce salaries during the eight-week period.

On May 13, 2021, the agency received notice that the PPP loan was forgiven, subject to conditions, in accordance with SBA regulations.

On June 30, 2020, the agency received a \$150,000 Economic Injury and Disaster Loan (EIDL) from the Small Business Administration at an interest of 2.75% per annum. The loan term is 30 years with the first payment due one year after the date of the loan. The loan is secured by of the assets of the agency.

7. <u>COVID RESPONSE</u>

The agency was not considered an essential business and as such, suspended program activities in 2020. The 2020 Festival and Pride events were cancelled. The agency met all guidelines set out by the CDC. Surfaces were kept clean and sanitized, face covering were provided and worn, and sanitizer was provided to all employees and visitors. Temperatures were taken regularly to minimize the spread of the disease. Employees who could, were allowed to work from home.

As noted above, the agency received a PPP loan and an Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) under federal programs designed to support small business and nonprofit organizations during the pandemic.

8. <u>DEFERRED REVENUE</u>

During the year ending December 31, 2020, sponsors paid fees to sponsor the 2020 Pride Festival and Events. The 2020 Festival was cancelled due to the COVID pandemic. These sponsors elected to have their sponsorship fees paid applied to the 2021 Pride Festival and Parade. Traditionally, the agency has not had deferred revenue as sponsorship fees are applicable to current year only. Deferred revenue on December 31, 2020 is \$63,975.

9. CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK FOR CASH HELD IN BANK

The agency had cash of more than \$250,000 in a bank account which is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. On December 31, 2020, the agency had an uninsured cash balance totaling \$77,741.

10. <u>NET ASSETS RESTATEMENT</u>

In the prior year, errors were made in recording cash disbursements. The result was that 2019 ending cash balance was overstated by \$33,048 and 2019 net assets was overstated by \$33,048. Had the entries been correctly recorded 2019 expenses would have increased by \$33,048. 2020 beginning balances were restated to correct the balances.

11. <u>SUBSEQUENT EVENTS</u>

Management has evaluated subsequent events through September 8, 2021, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued.
