BMC, Dana-Farber, MGN Formalize Collaboration

Boston Medical Center (BMC), Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH) have formalized a reciprocal agreement for joint clinical trials in cancer care. The agreement provides greater patient access to cancer clinical trials and increases research collaborations between the organizations.

With this new agreement, clinical trials may be led by principal investigators at Dana-Farber, MGH or BMC and will be open to patients at the hospitals. Several trials, generally for patients with advanced cancer, have been opened with a number of patients participating.

"This clinical trial collaboration between Boston Medical Center, Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and Massachusetts General Hospital

will facilitate the development of new cancer therapies across these outstanding academic medical centers," said Matthew Kulke, MD, the Chief of Hematology/Oncology at BMC and Co-Director of the Boston University-BMC Cancer Center. "Importantly, the collaboration also helps cancer patients, who will be able to access a broad range of

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new, innovative cancer treatments in any of the three facilities.”

“Enrolling patients into clinical trials helps them get the latest treatments, and helps researchers develop new therapies faster,” said Eric P. Winer, MD, Senior Vice President for Medical Affairs at Dana-Farber. “This impor-

tant collaboration with Boston Medical Center and Mass General will provide great benefits to cancer patients in our region and will help the institutions to pursue their shared mission of providing access and advancing our understanding for how to treat and prevent cancer.”

“We are delighted to collaborate with Boston Medical Center and Dana-Farber Cancer Institute to provide all patients with cancer throughout Greater Boston access to the

most promising novel treatments for cancer,” said Beverly Moy, MD, MPH, Mass General’s Director of Cancer Equity and Clinical Director of Breast Oncology. “This collaboration will lead to important developments of new evidence and therapies in this era of genomic and precision medicine in cancer care.”

This initiative reflects a systematic approach between top-ranked institutions to create an opportunity for the researchers and

faculty to learn from one another, combine efforts in developing new and innovative studies, and to expand the enrollment of trials to reach a larger, more diverse population of cancer patients.

The institutions will collaborate to identify those trials that are appropriate to open together, as well as opportunities to jointly develop new studies.

Dear Dog Lady,

We have given a forever home to a ten-year-old female pug who joined us in March from a local rescue group for senior dogs. She is adorable and friendly with all humans, including young children. Other dogs are a different issue. When she sees other dogs in the neighborhood, she becomes very agitated, starts darting around and barks aggressively. If she wasn’t controlled by her leash, she would attack (and has once when we didn’t have

control of the leash). Usually we pick her up and cradle her to calm her down, but her behavior limits us in terms of where we can board her if/when we go away. We would love to get her to be more comfortable around other dogs. Do you have any suggestions?

Dear Bernie,

The worst you can do is to pick her up and cradle her. She’s not a baby; she’s an elderly dog in a new home who’s feeling her way around. Let her stand on her own four feet and work it out with her peers. Ask a nice neighbor with a dog if you can take morning walks together. Your pug may have a moment of discomfort. After she gets used to the idea the other dog isn’t going anywhere, she should calm down for a nice, friendly, relaxed ramble. Two dogs, both on leashes, walking, sniffing, facing the world together should be calming for all involved.

We have been gone for three weeks on vacation and I sorted my laundry on the floor like I have done thousands of times before. We have a 9-year-old poodle mix, Daisy May, that we rescued. Today she has chewed three pairs of my underwear. She has never done

Dear Debi,

Did you take Daisy May away on vacation with you or did she stay behind? Was she left at a kennel? A cageless boarding place? Or at home? All of that matters in how she adjusted to your absence and what residue of bad feeling might have been left behind.

Actually, Daisy May probably did not chew your underwear to punish you. Dogs are not vengeful the way people are. But lingering feelings of insecurity may have caused her to do it. Or not. Maybe the only way to explain this is you left the underwear out in full, tempting available view of the dog. She may have had no choice.

Keep your things away from her. She’s not a robot. Daisy May will inevitably be tempted to sniff and/or chew on your things if she’s done it before. Help her become successful in conquering this bad habit by keeping your dog away from temptation.

Dear Dog Lady,

My sister wrote me this about her dog who recently died. She had him for 17 years: “He

was my constant little companion for so many years, just being happy to sit next me, following me from room to room. Then he would wait until I settled into one room and would come there and sit in one of the many doggie beds I had around the house. Eventually, he would just fall asleep in his bed in whatever room I was in, content to be near me. I would hear him snoring quietly behind me, a comforting presence. I have never before felt such undying devotion from any living thing, big or small, and I fear I never will again.

“For all of my dear friends who have a loving canine companion, give him or her extra caresses, treats, or walks today in remembrance of Biscuit (my sister’s dog). These animals give us so much and ask so little in return. I really loved that little guy and will miss him forever.”

The Mayor's Garden Contest recognizes gardeners who have landscaped, planted flowers, trees, shrubs, and vegetables, and in the process, helped beautify Boston's neighborhoods. The safety of gardeners and contest judges was the top priority of the Boston Parks and Recreation Department and gardeners were instructed to follow all current advisories from the Boston Public Health Commission and the City of Boston.

First place winners received the coveted "Golden Trowel" award from Mayor Walsh while second and third place winners were awarded certificates. Judging was held with social distancing and masks in use, as was the delivery of winner's certificates. First place winners were also eligible for a drawing for a JetBlue Grand Prize consisting of roundtrip flights for two to any nonstop destination from Boston. Terms, conditions, and blackout dates apply. Gardener's gift bags were provided by Mahoney's Garden Centers to the top three

HOMELESS SERVICES AND HOSPITAL CAPACITY

On April 2nd, Mayor Walsh announced that construction begins at the Boston Convention and Exhibition Center to add 500 beds for treating homeless adults who have tested positive for COVID-19 and need care, but do not require full hospitalization.

The City has released a Request for Proposals to secure a partner organization to operate the facility. If necessary, the Convention Center beds will be opened up for hospitals to use for sub-acute COVID patients in the general population.

These 500 beds will bring Boston's total number of new beds for homeless individuals to over 1,000. This includes Boston Medical Center's Newton Pavilion facility, which the City and State are working to re-purpose as a medical facility for homeless residents affected by the coronavirus.

SMALL BUSINESS SUPPORT

On April 2nd, Mayor Walsh announced two new resources that will help small businesses during the public health crisis.

The City of Boston has created a Small Business Relief Fund. Drawing on a combination of City, federal, and private industry contributions, it establishes \$2 million in grant funding—capable of providing a lifeline to hundreds of local businesses at risk of shutting down permanently due to the crisis. It will be administered as a streamlined version of the City's Small Business Financing program. Small businesses can begin applying on Monday, April 6.

The City of Boston has also created a Financial Relief Handbook and FAQ document for small businesses. It's a resource for navigating

both public and private capital programs. It puts information and guidance about all the different programs together in one place.

HOUSING SUPPORT

On April 2nd, The Mayor announced a new fund to help tenants who fall behind on rent in Boston because of the public health crisis.

The City of Boston has identified at least \$3 million in City and federal funds that can be repurposed quickly to help tenants who can't make their rent. This money will be targeted to households that have lost income due to the crisis, and who do not qualify for enough federal relief or unemployment benefits to make it up. The Office of Housing Stability will use its existing networks to get this help to where it's needed, quickly and fairly. Email housingstability@boston.gov to learn more.
